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RETAIN WHAT YOU READ

- It's too much to try remembering every single piece of information you read, so...
 - you need to get good at picking out and noticing the important points / parts that you want to remember
- Convert these main points into a simple images
- Depending on what you're trying to remember, you will used either
 - A) the Ken Jennings technique (linking method), or
 - B) Journey Rooms Method
- *I will teach you both ways, then give you my recommendations at the end



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RETAIN WHAT YOU READ

- There are 2 ways to memorize text:
 - 1) Create images for the main points as you read
 - Quicker. But may forget information without backtracking to review.
 - 2) Highlight or take notes & memorize from that
 - Notes are easier to memorize and review.

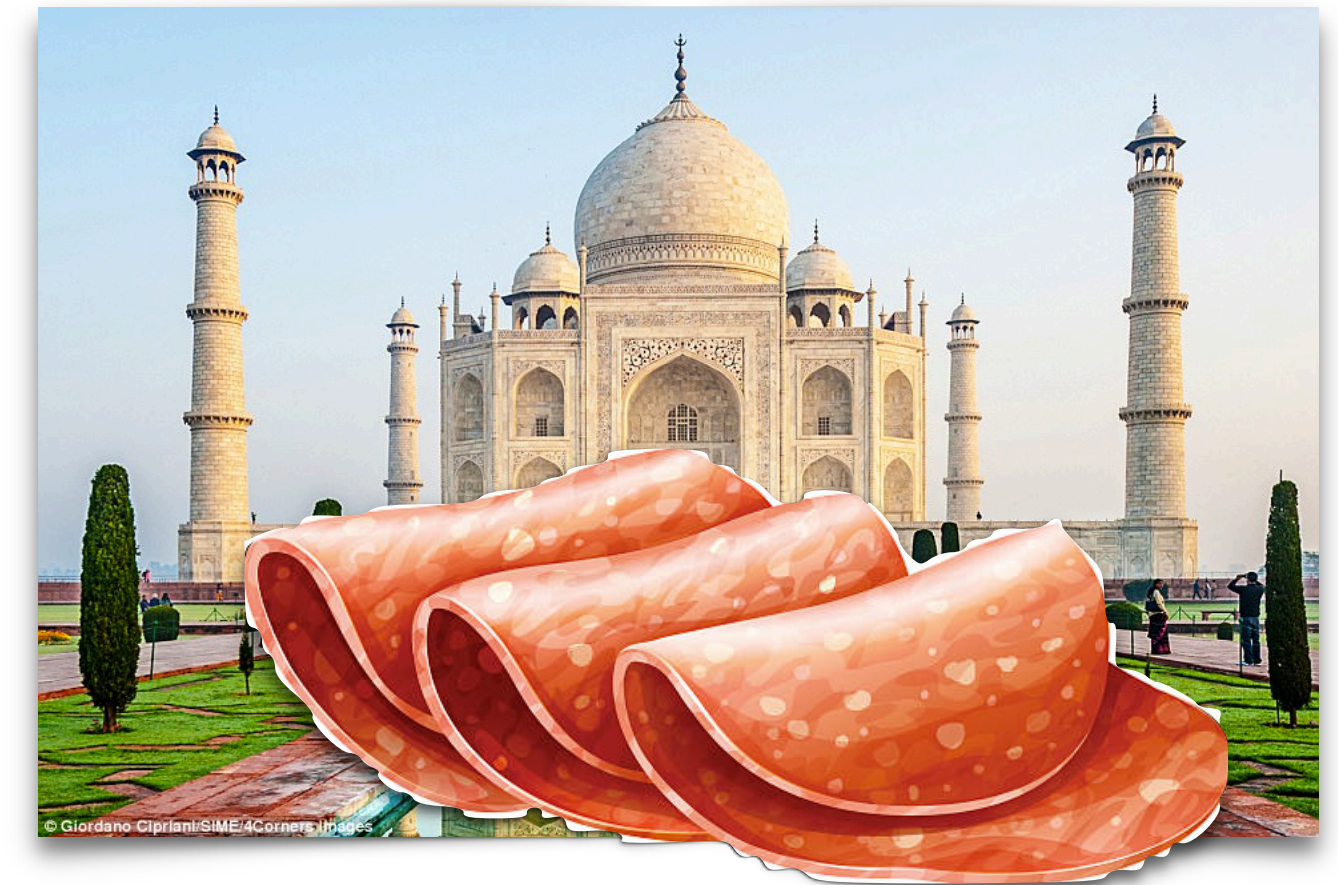
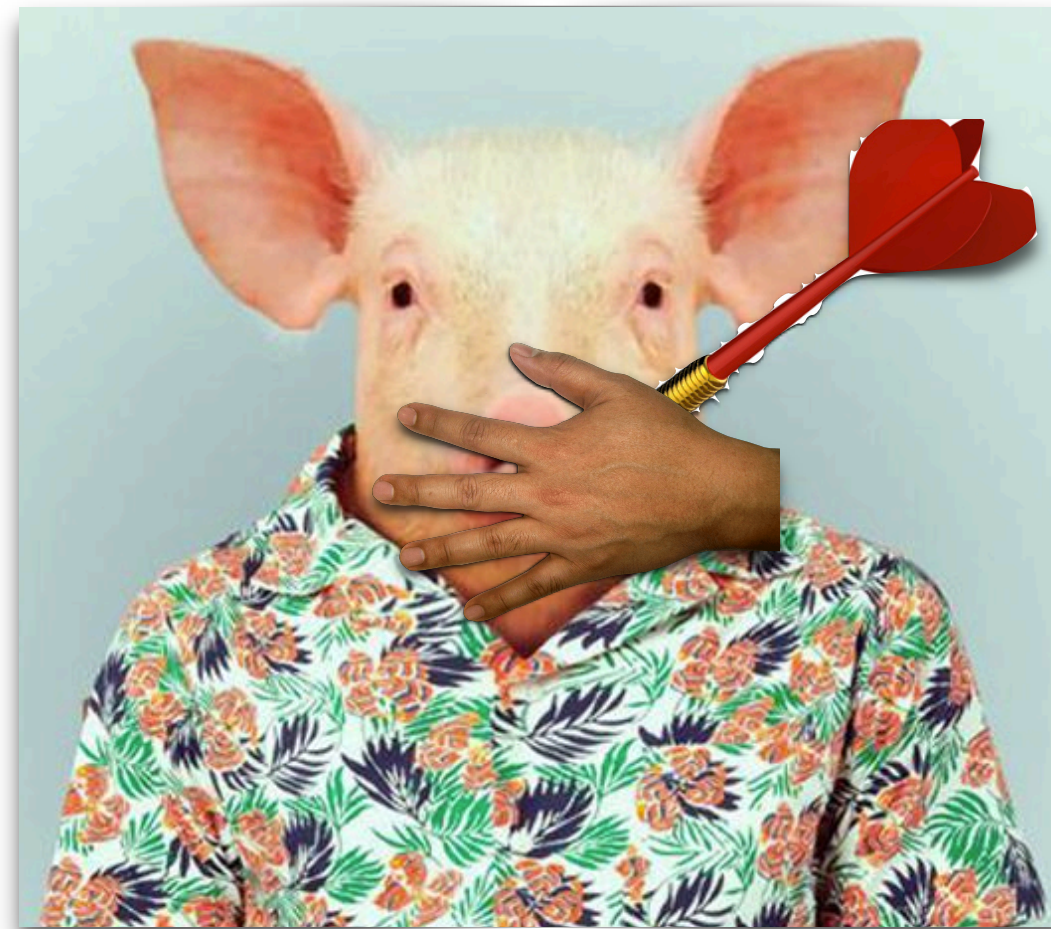


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EXAMPLES OF CREATING IMAGES

1) Dartmouth College is located in Hanover, New Hampshire

- Image: Throwing a dart in the mouth of a pig (ham) w/shirt. He puts his hand over mouth.



2) The capital of India is New Delhi

- Image: The Taj Mahal (represents India) has been renovated into a deli.



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HOW TO REMEMBER & RECITE WORD FOR WORD

- Things like: Scripture, Poetry, Quotes, Song Lyrics, Jokes, etc.
 - can be memorized word for word (or paraphrased)
- It will require more imagery and a bit more review time
 - But it is the absolute best way to memorize anything in detail



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REMEMBER & RECITE WORD FOR WORD

- Example: Bible verse from *1 Corinthians 13:4*
 - *“Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud.*
- Break it down into multiple images
 - 1 image per sentence, 1 image per half sentence, etc.
 - Depends on structure of sentence and your preference
 - Here’s how I would do it..



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REMEMBER & RECITE WORD FOR WORD

VERSE

- Love is patient,
- love is kind.
- It does not envy,

IMAGES

- Heart (love) on a hospital bed (patient)
- Heart rewinding VCR tape
- Clown from "It" with a doe snotting on money (envy)



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REMEMBER & RECITE WORD FOR WORD

VERSE

- it does not boast,
- it is not proud.

IMAGES

- Clown + doe snotting on a beef roast
- Clown snotting on bumper sticker



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REMEMBER & RECITE WORD FOR WORD

- Most text can be paraphrased (like we did in the last example)
- You don't need an image for every single word to remember it all
- But...
- If you do want to memorize EXACTLY word for word (including punctuation), you will need an image for every word and punctuation mark.
- Here's how to do it...



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REMEMBER & RECITE WORD FOR WORD

- Most words (nouns, adjectives) are easy to quickly create images for
- However, common words (the, a, if, and, so, why, what,...) are much harder.
- So, I create my own:

WORD	IMAGE
that	hat
the	inch worm
me	Mini Me
are	pirate
his	snake hissing
there	hair
and	sand

WORD	IMAGE
I	eye
to, too	tooth
with	witch
from	prom
they	hay
have	shave

REMEMBER & RECITE WORD FOR WORD

- Create images to remember punctuation (,.;!?)

comma ,	getting wet, dripping
period .	NAIL
Capitalize	steroids/supersize/buff
<u>underlined</u>	laser beam

<i>italics</i>	blowing in the wind
colon :	intestines/poop
semicolon ;	semi truck
dash -	dash of pepper



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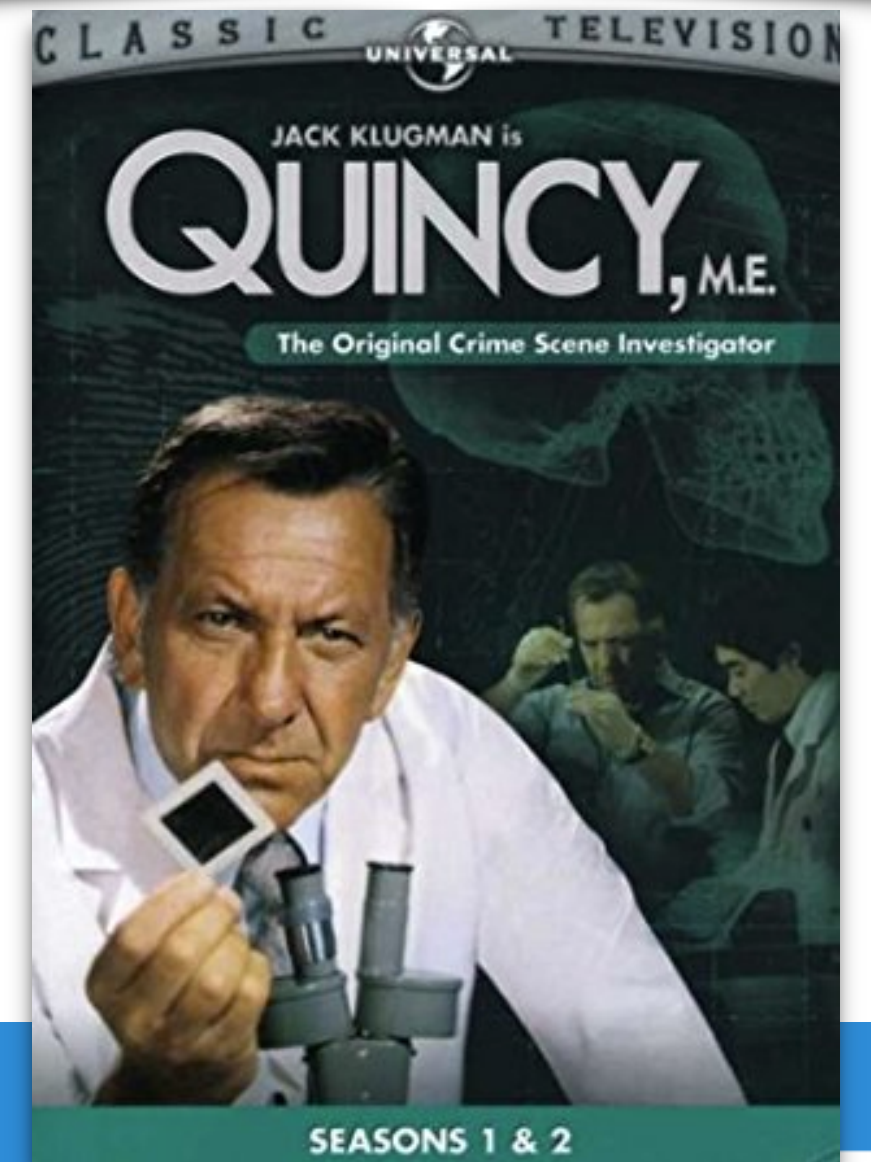
REMEMBER & RECITE WORD FOR WORD

- Example:
 - *“His teacher likes that book too.”*
- Imagine:
 - *His teacher* = snake hissing at a teacher
 - *likes that* = teacher licking a hat
 - *book too* = hat contains a book with a tooth
 - *.* (period) = a large nail is hammered into the book

WORDS	IMAGES
his	hissing snake
that	hat
to, too	tooth
period .	NAIL

KEN JENNINGS TECHNIQUE

- Ken Jennings (Jeopardy) uses the linking method to memorize facts as he reads
- Example: To remember that President John Quincy Adams was elected in 1824.
 - Jennings says: "I'd picture Quincy, M.E. working a 24-hour shift or something."
- Forming an image that associates/links all the information is all you need.
- You can store images/stories like this in your Journeys, or simply link the images as you go (like Ken does)...no Journey required. You're just mentally connecting information together.



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JOURNEY ROOMS = STORE MORE IMAGES

- Store all info (from one book, one poem, etc.) in one room of your Journey
 - Group together (living room is one book or one poem, kitchen is another)
 - Or use entire Journey for 1 book, 1 poem, etc.
 - Beneficial for storing lots of information (books, studying)
- Pack in more info, use less Journeys
- Need to review more carefully since many images



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JOURNEY ROOMS = STORE MORE IMAGES

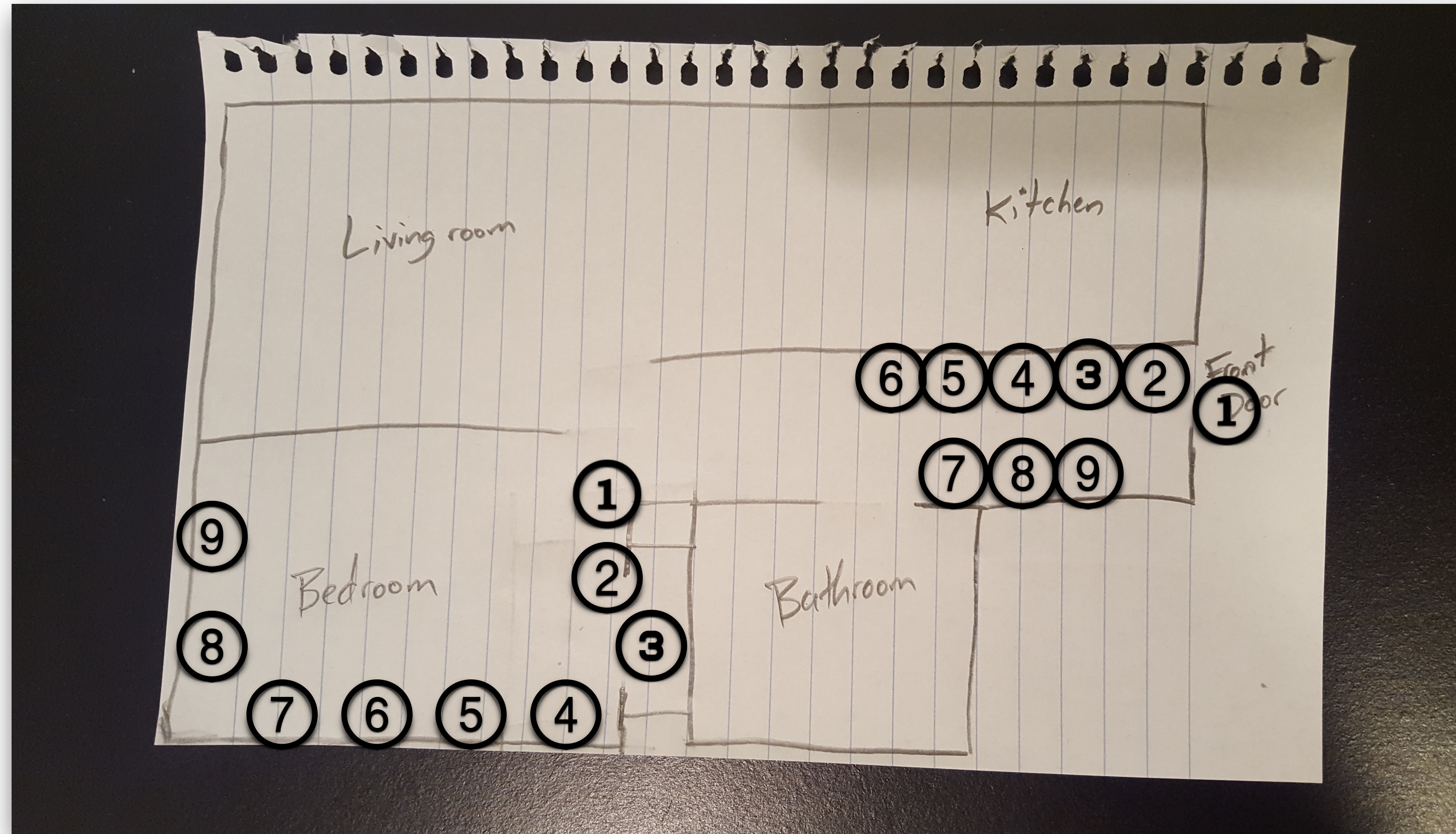
- Interact images with each other
 - image 1 bumps into image 2, touches 3, leans into 4, etc
 - like falling Dominos



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JOURNEY ROOMS TO STORE MORE IMAGES

- Instead of having 20 locations in your entire Journey, pack your Journey with many images in a chain



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WHAT I RECOMMEND

- If you're simply trying to remember/retain more of what you read
 - Use the linking method (Ken Jennings technique)
 - Just create simple images that link all the main parts together. No Journey required.
- If you are memorizing specific text (poems, scripture, quotes, etc).
 - Use the Journey method. Journey rooms to store more images/info.



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KEY TAKEAWAYS

- Memorize word for word by creating images for each word and punctuation.
- Ken Jennings technique (linking method) - create quick imagery that links the main pieces together
